for-granted nature of its acknowledgement often interferes with its effective academic theorization. The meaning and significance of home, as many writers and scholars from the field of diaspora studies have rightly argued, can be best understood in association with the notion of displacement and homelessness. The physiological and psychological state of being unhomed does not merely draw attention to its own crises, but throws into relief all the significations of home as a location of being in the world as well.
