This report takes into consideration the accomplishments of the session 2022-2023.

The institution has completed third cycle of accreditation by NAAC. The IQAC undertakes AAA to monitor and evaluate the institutional progress. 

A recent trend in higher educational institutions is to establish high standards and benchmarks in keeping with the institutions vision and mission. Academic Audit is a mechanism designed and intended to examine and enhance the quality of academic aspects of institutes of Higher Education. The purpose of the audit is to evaluate the performance of various departments of the institution and give suggestions for further improvement of the quality of teaching, research, administration, curricular and co-curricular activities. It emphasizes on reviewing the performance of the academic inputs with respect to quality assurance for the optimum utilization of resources and continuous improvement of quality. Administrative Audit intends to assess the efficiency and effectiveness of the operating system of the administrative procedures, policies, decision-making authorities and functionaries, strategies, process, feedback, control mechanism and so on. Academic and Administrative Audit is a standard strategy for quality enhancement of Institutes of Higher education and offers a standard system based on parameters for Quality education. Fostering cultural, ethical, moral and social values in the human resources of the institution and reinforcing bonds with parents and alumni to improve the quality of education. The institution has completed third cycle of accreditation by NAAC. The IQAC undertakes AAA to monitor and evaluate the institutional progress. Academic audit is a process of reviewing the quality of academic process and the Administrative audit is a process of evaluating the effectiveness of administrative procedures.

This particular Academic and Administrative Audit was carried out on the basis of the criteria put forward by NAAC. The audit has been carried out on the basis of 10 criteria and 41 parameters and observations and remarks/ suggestions accompany each. It is hoped that the audit may serve to understand the strengths and weaknesses of the institution and to serve as a basis of positive measures towards quality enhancement.
